INCIDENT ACTION PLAN

Establishing Incident Objectives

Determining the incident objectives and strategy is essential. Incident objectives should have SMART characteristics:

- Specific Is the wording precise and unambiguous?
- Measurable How will achievements be measured?
- Action-Oriented Is an action verb used to describe expected accomplishments?
- Realistic Is the outcome achievable with given available resources?
- Time Sensitive What is the timeframe?

Initial Scene Size-up

- What is the nature of the incident?
- How large is the affected area?
- What hazards are present?
- Are there any potential safety risks?
- Could the situation worsen suddenly? How?
- How can the area be secured?
- What initial resources are required?
- Is this likely to be a prolonged incident?
- Which location would make a good staging area?
- Which access/egress routes would assist the flow of response personnel and equipment?

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Standard Response Goals

- · Protect the safety and health of all responders
- Save lives and reduce suffering
- · Protect public health
- · Protect critical infrastructure
- Protect property
- · Protect the environment
- · Reduce economic and social losses

Tactical Priorities

- · Assess the scene and determine the hazards/threats faced
- Establish a perimeter identifying hazard zones
- Determine resource needs
- · Stabilize the scene and ensure the safety of all involved
- Triage, treat, and transport the injured
- · Evacuate those in harm's way
- Secure the scene for investigation
- · Coordinate information distribution with the media
- · Begin recovery operations
