INCIDENT ACTION PLAN

ESTABLISHING INCIDENT OBJECTIVES

Incident objectives should have SMART characteristics:

- · Specific: Is the wording precise and unambiguous?
- Measurable: How will achievements be measured?
- Action-Oriented: Is an action verb used to describe expected accomplishments?
- Realistic: Is the outcome achievable with given available resources?
- Time-Sensitive: What is the timeframe?

STANDARD RESPONSE GOALS

- · Protect the safety and health of all responders
- Save lives and reduce suffering
- Protect public health
- Protect critical infrastructure
- Protect property
- · Protect the environment
- · Reduce economic and social losses





INITIAL SCENE SIZE-UP

- What is the nature of the incident?
- How large is the affected area?
- What hazards are present?
- Are there any potential safety risks?
- Could the situation worsen suddenly? How?
- · How can the area be secured?
- · What initial resources are required?
- · Is this likely to be a prolonged incident?
- Which location would make a good staging area?

- Which access/egress routes would assist the flow of response personnel and equipment?
- Who do I need to notify about this?
 Who else should I notify?
- How can I ensure all responders are aware of perimeters and access/ egress routes?
- Which location would be suitable for the Incident Command Post?
- Will a Mass Casualty Plan be needed and have local hospitals been alerted?

TACTICAL PRIORITIES

- Assess the scene and determine the hazards/threats faced
- Establish a perimeter identifying hazard zones: Hot (Red), Warm (Yellow), Cold (Blue)
- Determine resource needs and ensure resource requests are made
- Stabilize the scene and ensure the safety of all involved

- Triage, treat, and transport the injured
- Evacuate those in harm's way
- Secure the scene for investigation
- Identify authorized Public Information Officer and coordinate information distribution with the media
- · Begin recovery operations
